### **SAINT OF THE WEEK – 11 December – St Damasus I, Pope**

Of Spanish descent, Pope St Damasus I was born in Rome about 305. He became church archivist and preserved records of the still-recent persecutions. (Emperor Constantine the Great had declared legal toleration for Christianity in the Edict of Milan in 313, after two-and-a-half centuries of Imperial Roman persecution.) Elected pope in 366, Damasus was devoted to promoting the veneration of the martyrs.

It was under Pope Damasus that in 380, Roman Emperor Theodosius, with his co-emperors, moved beyond simple toleration and declared the Catholic Church to be the recognised state religion of the Roman Empire, acknowledging Pope Damasus as its primary voice:

‘...that religion which was delivered to the Romans by the divine Apostle Peter, as it has been preserved by faithful tradition, and which is now professed by the Pontiff Damasus and by Peter, Bishop of Alexandria... We authorise the followers of this law to assume the title of Catholic Christians.’ (*The first known use of the expression ‘the Catholic Church’ is in a letter of St Ignatius of Antioch from about AD 110.*)

Thus was completed the full reversal of the Empire, from having once crucified Christ and martyred his followers, to now being itself officially committed to his worship.

Pope Damasus presided at the Council of Rome (382) that decreed the correct list of books in Scripture (the Canon of Scripture) – the same list as would be defined infallibly by the Ecumenical Council of Trent in 1546.

When St Jerome, the great biblical scholar among the saints, was, as a young priest, secretary to Damasus from 382 to 384, the Pope entrusted him with revising existing Latin translations of the Gospels. (This went on to become Jerome’s virtually complete translation of the Bible into Latin, the Vulgate, completed in 405, and still the standard Latin translation in the Catholic Church.)

St Jerome wrote to Pope Damasus: ‘As I follow no leader save Christ, so I communicate with none but your blessedness, that is with the chair of Peter. For this, I know, is the rock on which the Church is built! ...This is the ark of Noah, and he who is not found in it shall perish when the flood prevails.’

Pope St Damasus died on 11 December 384.

### **SAINT OF THE WEEK – 14 December – St John of the Cross, Priest and Doctor of the Church**

St John of the Cross (Juan de Yepes y Álvarez) was born on 24 June 1542 at Fontiveros, near Avila in Spain, to a family descended from Jewish converts to Catholicism. He entered the Carmelite Order in 1563, and was ordained priest in 1567.

Later that year he met the Carmelite nun St Teresa of Avila (1515-82), who persuaded him to collaborate with her in reforming the Carmelites. In 1568, he took on as his religious name, ‘of the Cross’, and established the first reformed monastery for Carmelite friars at Duruelo. Further foundations followed. From 1572 he was five years in Avila, where he was spiritual director for many, including St Teresa and her convent of 130 nuns.

Resistance from some Carmelite friars to the reform movement led to increasing tensions, and in 1577, opponents captured John and imprisoned him in a monastery in Toledo in harsh conditions, accusing him of disobedience. Here he wrote his poem, *The Spiritual Canticle*. John escaped from captivity in August 1578.

In 1580, Pope Gregory XIII authorised the separation of the old Carmelites and the reformed ‘discalced’ Carmelites, easing the tensions. St John continued to

establish new reformed monasteries and make visitations to them.

From 1578, he wrote deeply about the spiritual life and mystical union with God, producing four masterpieces at the pinnacle of mystical theology: *The Spiritual Canticle*, *The Ascent of Mount Carmel*, *The Dark Night of the Soul*, and *The Living Flame of Love*. (His ‘dark night of the soul’ has now become a well-known phrase; St John’s meaning is not just any suffering or spiritual dryness, but a rare stage of advanced spiritual purification in which God prepares a soul for total union with him.)

St John of the Cross died at Ubeda in Andalusia on 14 December 1591, aged 49. Nine months later his body was found to be perfectly incorrupt and fragrant - a reality inexplicable by natural laws, but found with a substantial number of saints, and which can last for centuries: a sign of the resurrection to come. At its latest examination in 1955, St John’s body, though slightly discoloured, was still incorrupt, perfectly moist and flexible. (Cruz, *The Incorruptibles*, pp. 199-201)

John was beatified by Pope Clement X in 1675 and canonised by Pope Benedict XIII in 1726. In 1926, Pope Pius XI declared him a Doctor of the Church.

### **Catechism of the Catholic Church — John, precursor, prophet, and baptist**

523 St. John the Baptist is the Lord's immediate precursor or forerunner, sent to prepare his way. "Prophet of the Most High", John surpasses all the prophets, of whom he is the last. He inaugurates the Gospel, already from his mother's womb welcomes the coming of Christ, and rejoices in being "the friend of the bridegroom", whom he points out as "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world". Going before Jesus "in the spirit and power of Elijah", John bears witness to Christ in his preaching, by his Baptism of conversion, and through his martyrdom.

717 "There was a man sent from God, whose name was John." John was "filled with the Holy Spirit even from his mother's womb" by Christ himself, whom the Virgin Mary had just conceived by the Holy Spirit. Mary's visitation to Elizabeth thus became a visit from God to his people.

718 John is "Elijah [who] must come." The fire of the Spirit dwells in him and makes him the forerunner of the coming Lord. In John, the precursor, the Holy Spirit

completes the work of "[making] ready a people prepared for the Lord."

719 John the Baptist is "more than a prophet." In him, the Holy Spirit concludes his speaking through the prophets. John completes the cycle of prophets begun by Elijah. He proclaims the imminence of the consolation of Israel; he is the "voice" of the Consoler who is coming. As the Spirit of truth will also do, John "came to bear witness to the light." In John's sight, the Spirit thus brings to completion the careful search of the prophets and fulfils the longing of the angels. "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptises with the Holy Spirit. And I have seen and have borne witness that this is the Son of God...Behold, the Lamb of God."

720 Finally, with John the Baptist, the Holy Spirit begins the restoration to man of "the divine likeness," prefiguring what he would achieve with and in Christ. John's baptism was for repentance; baptism in water and the Spirit will be a new birth.
